A Fresh Start

Choose the Best

Remember Jesus' promise: My Burden is Light. Make a poster of that if you need to. Often, when we are doing too much, we are doing things no one is asking us to do, including God!

Focus on People

Never forget ministry is people, not programs. Set some goals for ways you will touch people's lives. Visits, notes, calls, or simply encouraging emails will be remembered longer and be more impactful than the biggest church event. Jesus offered no programs, only time spent with those He was investing in. Take note!

you read the words, "My yoke is easy and my burden is light," do you think, "Well, Jesus couldn't have been talking about kids ministry!?

This may sound harsh, but you've got to hear it, and I say it to myself as much as I say it to you: IT'S NOT YOUR MINISTRY, IT IS GOD'S, AND HE IS QUITE CAPABLE OF RUNNING IT WITHOUT YOU.

Listen to me... verily, verily, I say unto you: When you stress over your ministry you have taken the ministry away from God and have made it your responsibility to solve its problems.

So when a problem, like volunteer openings, remains unsolved you may feel as if you have failed -- or worse, that God has failed you. We need to be reminded that the ministry belongs to God. How you act on and implement this fact can have a profound impact on your ministry! Hear this please - you are merely the <u>steward</u> of God's ministry. The day you begin to feel under-appreciated, taken for granted, frustrated, or like a failure is the day you cease to allow God to run His children's ministry. If you take the ministry from God, you become a hindrance to what he wants to accomplish.

We often turn ourselves into the "protector" (or even "savior") of programs. If God wants a program to launch or continue, He will provide the leadership and workers. If He doesn't provide, it may be his way of suggesting something to you. The Bible doesn't lay out programs we must have. It just calls us to make disciples and reach the lost. Programs are fine, as long as they are means to an end, never the end in and of themselves.

Where God leads, He provides.

So how can you lead as a steward and not stress over the details? Prayerfully give the ministry back to God and watch what He will do. Keep in mind, God is more interested in growing YOU than your ministry.

1. Develop a Child's Perspective

sporting events I showed up at, the birthday parties I attended, or the miniature golf outings we had.

It's the little things that matter to kids.

If we're really going to make a lasting impact on children, we need to do more than just teach them or program for them.

What does it mean to connect with kids? What does that connection look like? What must you do to become a genuine kid connector? Follow these on at any time to help you see the world as kids see it.

2. Find Things in Common

If having things in common is how and why you connect with adults, why wouldn't the same be true for connecting with children? Find ways to get on their level by being part of their world.

3. Engage Kids in Their World

Listen to what children talk about. To enter into the conversation and

connect, you need a key - something that proves you belong there.

4. Touch Kids' Lives Outside of Class

Children live in a world where there's always an adult in front guiding their activities. To make real connections with kids, you must impact them outside of church or the classroom.

Be creative! Find out what you can do to surprise and delight your kids with the ways you reach out to them. You'll make connections that'll make your teaching take on new relevance and effectiveness. You'll not only be their teacher, you'll also be their friend.

The Apostle Paul said he became all things to all men so that they might be reached. (I Corinthians 9:21-22)

We can do the same to reach children!

More Kids in Single Parent Homes

Single Parent Households are a growing share of all American families. Back in 1960, 92% of all households had two married parents raising children while in 2011 the number was 67%. 40% of all children are born to single moms. That is up from 1.9 million in 1960 to 8.6 million by 2011. The number of single dads has also grown exponentially. In 1960, there were 300,000 households headed by single dads. By 2011, that had escalated to more than 2.6 million. (*Engage Moms 7/24/13*)
